COLUMBIA — The chairman of the Senate Finance Committee today asked state transportation officials to find funding to complete widening of Interstate 85 to the North Carolina border, arguing that more transportation money

has gone to other areas of the state over the past 15 years. $\overrightarrow{\mathbf{R}}$

Sen. Hugh Leatherman of Florence, who not only chairs the Senate Finance

Committee but also the Joint Bond Review Committee, made his remarks at the end of a meeting of the state Transportation Infrastructure Bank, another panel on which he sits.

Two other segments of I-85 improvements and widening, from Greenville to Cherokee County, are among the seven projects the state Department of Transportation board has asked the Infrastructure Bank to help

fund with bonds issued as a result of this year's legislative appropriation. $\ensuremath{\ensuremath{\mathbb{Z}}}$

The board delayed action on that request today after one member

said he had not had enough time to review the projects. $\ensuremath{\vec{\ensuremath{\mathbb{Z}}}}$

DOT Chairman Johnny Edwards of Travelers Rest said the segment discussed by Leatherman is about 10 miles long and would cost

about \$171 million.

If funded, that would leave a section stretching from Anderson County to the Georgia line as the lone segment of the busy interstate that has not been widened.
